Walldogs Magical History Tour Rolls On

On May 16 of 1848, thousands of people gathered in downtown Keene for a huge celebration. They had congregated to greet the first passenger train to roll into Keene. With the train's arrival came

the local introduction to the nation's most modern technology. The impact of the railroad on the community cannot be exaggerated. It made Keene what it is today – the economic center and only city in the region.

Thousands of people gathered in downtown Keene 171 years later for another celebration. This assembly came together in June 2019 to celebrate history, art and community spirit by participating in the Walldogs Magical History Tour mural festival. The visiting Walldogs group, made up of more than 200 muralists and sign painters from around the world, converged on Keene to celebrate the city's heritage by creating 16 artistic wall murals throughout the downtown area, including one that salutes the impact of the railroad. The Walldogs were joined by more than 100 volunteers and thousands of festival goers from near and far. The result was a true festival atmosphere that was fun, educational, historical, and meticulously organized.

The Historical Society was honored to be part of the 20-month planning and preparation process that brought the "history tour" to the city. The 4-day



festival was a wonderful event for Keene, but the excitement did not end when the Walldogs left town. The city now has 16 pieces of quality public art that illustrate the community's unique history. The Historical Society will take a lead role in showcasing this combination of art and history and

sharing it with tourists, local residents and students of all ages.

The Society will prepare curriculum for local schools and classes for adults focusing on the 16 historical topics illustrated in the murals.



We will also offer walking tour booklets and hope to assist with the development of a Keene Walldogs tour computer app for use on mobile devices. Most directly and immediately, the Society will offer 2-hour guided mural walking tours. Details about upcoming tours are posted on page 9 of this newsletter. We hope you will join us for a fun and informative tour where you will learn more about Keene's extraordinary history.

Bob Weekes Remembered

The Historical Society of Cheshire County lost a dear friend, tireless worker and enthusiastic supporter with the recent passing of former board member Bob Weekes. Bob first arrived at the Society about 30 years ago when the organization was featuring an exhibit entitled "Made in Keene." Bob was an active collector of the types of items that made up the exhibit – products made in Keene and advertising for those products. He immediately became involved with the Society by loaning items for the exhibit.

Bob had a successful career on Madison Avenue, retiring in 1988 as an executive vice president of an advertising firm there. Bob and his family had a long connection to the Monadnock Region, which they made permanent upon his retirement by moving into an 18th century farmhouse in Richmond.

Bob was active in Historical Society exhibits, events and activities for several years prior to joining the board in 2006. His involvement increased dramatically when he took on the leadership of the Society's Marketing Committee. His advertising background and guidance was essential in taking the organization to a new level of marketing and visibility in the region. Bob launched the "Tavern Keeper" program in support of Wyman Tavern activities, directed several delightful skits for the Society's annual "Auction of Historic Proportions" - whose name he coined - and was instrumental in the expansion of the Society's mission and the move toward a cultural heritage center focus. He served on the board until 2012.

Bob's collecting interests went beyond historic Keene advertising and products; he collected those types of items for the entire Monadnock Region, as well as local glass, New Hampshire paintings, and other items as well. He took great pleasure in sharing those items and interests with other collectors. He was, in fact, the driving force behind one the organization's most ambitious and successful exhibits ever, entitled "Canvassing the White Mountains: Icons of Place." The exhibit consisted of a breathtaking collection of White Mountains and Monadnock Region artwork.

Bob Weekes encouraged the staff and the board to push their limits, to try new things and to move in new directions if it was for the good of the organization. The expiration of his term did not end his involvement with the Society. He continued to be a valued advisor, mentor, consultant, and friend for the remainder of his life.

Wyman Tavern Brew Fest 2019: Congratulations to The Outlaw Brewing Company and The Brewers of Nye Hill Farm

For the second year in a row, two brewers from the Monadnock region have taken home the People's Choice honors at the Wyman Tavern Brew Fest. The People's Choice award for best brewer went to The Outlaw Brewery from Winchester, New Hampshire. The Outlaw brought its Watermelon Wheat beer, its Experimental IPA with a blast of black licorice, and its Peanut Butter White Stout. The best brew award went to the Brewers of Nye Hill Farm in Roxbury, New Hampshire for their ginger lime wheat ale called "The Statesman."

About 550 people turned out to sample some of New England's finest craft beers and to support the Historical Society of Cheshire County. Twenty-four craft beer brewers, two local distillers, a meadery, and a cider orchard provided samples of their products for guests to taste. The event was a roaring success, raising about \$18,000 after expenses.

New this year at the Brew Fest was a series of cooking demonstrations emceed by Keene cooking icon Luca Paris. Joining Luca were Chef Geo from The Stage, Sushant Dhuri from Royal Spice, and Jordan Scott from Machina Arts. A big theme was cooking with beer as one might expect.

The Bruder House Welcomes Hundreds of Visitors

In its first three months of operations, the Historical Society's newest facility, the Bruder House, has been embraced by the community. About 300 people visited the Bruder House at its June 1 opening day, and since then over 1,500 people have attended programs there. The Bruder House has already been used for the launch of a book, an 18th century festival, visits by schools, a summer camp, workshops on traditional crafts and hearth cooking, a meeting of a local foundation, presentations, cooking demonstrations by local chefs, and even a wedding.

More History Meets Exercise: The History of Gym Class

Wednesday, September 25rd, 2019. 7:00 pm. Free. Keene Family YMCA 200 Summit Road, Keene.

Rebecca Noel explores the sometimes alarming, sometimes hilarious backstory of what we now know as gym class. Physicians have worried since the Renaissance that the sedentary, scholarly life makes people sick. They focused on varying concerns over time: digestive woes, melancholy, tuberculosis, spinal curvature, and reproductive weakness. The problems increased with access to education during the Enlightenment and into the 1800s.


Tracing this idea from Europe to the United States, from scholars to children, and from boys' to girls' education, the presentation shows how these fears inspired schools to get children moving. The (optional) interactive aspects of the presentation will include audience testing of historic exercise schemes, some done in pairs. The program concludes with audience discussion of the relevance of this problem to our own times—like the Enlightenment, a moment in history when many more people live the sedentary lives once limited to a few scholars.


Castles of Ireland. The two of you will live like kings and queens on your magnificent trip to green and glorious

Wyman Tavern & Horatio Colony House Museum Annual Candlelight Open House on Main Street


Friday, October 4, 2019. 7:00-8:30pm.

Renovations at Historical Society Headquarters this Fall

The Historical Society Headquarters in the Ball Mansion is currently under renovation. The building at 246 Main Street **is open**, but there will be no exhibits, programs, or museum store until renovations to the spaces involved are complete. The Wright Room is open to researchers, and visitors are always welcome.

Plans for renovation include a new museum store location at the front of the building, a permanent exhibit located in the foyer, a Cheshire County history exhibit in the hallway, a sound system for the hearing impaired in the exhibit hall, the creation of the Jonathan Daniels

Center for Social Responsibility in the space formerly used for the permanent exhibit, and various energy-saving and security upgrades.

For safety during the renovations, we ask that visitors use the ramp and enter the building from the back parking lot, since much of the work will take place in the hall and the front of the building. The administrative assistant's office and information desk will temporarily be located in the exhibit hall during construction.

Rental space will be available at the Bruder House and on the Wyman Tavern grounds while renovations are underway at the Ball Mansion. Call the Historical Society for rates and availability.
