Keene's Jennie B. Powers to be Subject of Documentary

Sunday, December 30, 1917 Boston Sunday Post

Woman Deputy Sheriff, Armed with .44 Revolver, Says "Just Let Them Try It."

Keene, NH. Dec. 29-- Mrs. Jennie B. Powers, deputy sheriff of Cheshire County, widely known as "The Woman Who Dares" because of her daring work in making arrests, has been threatened with death.

"You have got to the end of your rope. Beware of your life," are the words written in a bold hand in one anonymous letter. Another says, "I will kill you. This is from the devil," written in a very scrawly hand with the words badly misspelled.

NOW GOES ARMED

Yet Mrs. Powers labors on cheerfully and says she is not worrying, but friends have prevailed upon her to go armed, and almost any day now she can be seen riding about the country or walking the streets with a .44 caliber revolver strapped to her side. At night she sleeps with the gun under her pillow.

"I am armed and ready for them if they want to start anything," declared Mrs. Powers today. "It's simply a case of who gets in the first shot, and I have been taught how to handle a gun since girlhood," said she smilingly, as she patted the revolver strapped to her side.

Jennie B. Powers was once known across the country as *The Woman Who Dares*, cited by the Boston Post newspaper as having arrested more men than any other woman in the country by 1906. She was born Jennie Belle Carter in 1864 in Brattleboro, VT. In her youth, Powers developed a love of the



natural world, often collecting specimens of insects, reptiles, and small animals. As she grew into her teenage years, she learned to shoot. By the time she reached adulthood and married, Powers had become very involved in preventing cruelty to animals.

In 1903, the Keene Humane Society hired Jennie Powers as its first female agent. Soon she was investigating and working to prosecute hundreds of cases of abuse each year. Within a couple of years, Powers was deputized by the county sheriff, making it easier for her to arrest accused abusers. She continued to work as the humane society agent in this region until her death in 1936.

Jennie Powers' legacy is remembered in many ways. In 1967, for instance, the Keene Humane Society named their 250 acre site the Jennie B. Powers Memorial Shelter in her honor. Today the Monadnock Humane Society continues her legacy of honoring and respecting the relationship between humans and animals.

As anyone who has driven up Main Street towards Central Square knows, Jennie B. Powers' image greets passersby on a daily basis. Her like-

The Historical Society of Cheshire County now lends primary source materials related to Jennie Powers to middle and high school educators for free. A small booklet, *Caring for Pets*, introduces Jennie Powers and the role that citizens play in caring for animals to kindergarten to third grade students. Director of Education Jennifer Carroll has become a humanities-to-go presenter for the NH Humanities, sharing Jennie B. Powers with residents across the state.

The story of Jennie B. Powers and the work of humane societies in the early 20th century will now be the subject of a short documentary, set to be released in March 2022. Keene's Emmy-award winning production company, SALT Project, is collaborating with the Historical Society of Cheshire County to transform Carroll's NH Humanities-to-go program *The Woman Who Dares* into a short film. Historical Society archival materials and photographs, along with shadow puppets designed by Stringpullers Puppet Company of New York, combine to bring Powers' story to life.



African American Soldiers and Sailors of New Hampshire During the American Revolution

One of the most interesting aspects of the American Revolution is the role played by African Americans in the fight for independence. Both free African Americans and those who were enslaved were key in manning state militias and Continental Army units, as well as serving on the high seas in the Navy and on privately armed ships. Indeed, their service to the colonies was crucial in a conflict that lasted nearly seven years. Prohibited from serving in military units and largely considered "undesirable elements," how is it that these African American soldiers came to fight for the cause of liberty, even when their own personal liberty was not guaranteed?

Glenn Knoblock examines the history of African American soldiers' service during the war, including how and why they enlisted, their interaction with white soldiers, service on the battlefields, how they were perceived by the enemy and by the officers under whom they served, and their treatment after the war.



Jennie B. Powers: The Woman Who Dares

Jennie B. Powers: The Woman Who Dares tells the story of a Progressive Era woman who became a Humane Society agent and one of the first female deputy sheriffs in the country, with jurisdiction in New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Vermont. Armed with both a camera and a revolver, she was said to have arrested more men than any other woman in the United States, rescued thousands of animals, and protected countless women and children from domestic violence.

A co-production of the Historical Society of Cheshire County and SALT Project, this short documentary explores

Powers' life and legacy, inspiring a hope born of courage in the face of suffering and injustice. A discussion with the filmmaker Liz Myer Boulton and Historical Society education director Jennifer Carroll will follow the film. This production was made possible thanks to the support of New Hampshire Humanities, the Putnam Foundation, the Kingsbury Fund, and Arts Alive. Admission is \$5. 

Sixty years ago, in 1962, F. Nelson Blount's Monadnock, Steamtown & Northern Railroad thundered out of Keene on the Boston & Maine Railroad's Cheshire Branch, briefly returning the Elm City to the nostalgic era of steam railroading. Meanwhile, plans for the largest steam railroading museum in the United States, Steamtown U.S.A., bubbled to the brink of possibility for Keene only to be extinguished by red tape and political delays. In a dynamic presentation, Rick Kfoury, author of *Steam Trains of Yesteryear: The Monadnock, Steamtown & Northern Story*, will examine Keene's last chance for railroad prominence with never-beforeseen photographs, documents, 8mm film and in-person accounts.

For more than two years, fifty-five accomplished photographers from around NH photographed all aspects of the state and contemporary life here – the natural environment, built environment, unfolding events, and people going about their daily lives. See the results of their work in the Historical Society's current exhibit *New Hampshire Now.* A publication by the same name is available for sale in the Historical Society's Museum Store.

Other participating institutions in this state wide exhibition are the Belknap Mill Society, Davidow Center of Art and Design at Colby-Sawyer College, Millyard Museum, Museum of the White Mountains at Plymouth State University, New Hampshire Historical Society, Portsmouth Historical Society and Tillotson Center.
