George Wheelock probably did more than any other individual to conserve land in Keene for recreational and educational purposes. His untiring effort to conserve natural space for public use is an example of the interaction between humanity and nature in the Monadnock region.

"Nature and Humanity in the Monadnock Region" will be the topic of the Historical Society's feature exhibit during the summer of 2022. Dozens of local artists are preparing work based on the theme of the interaction between people and nature throughout the region. The exhibit will be held at Historical Society headquarters in Keene from the beginning of June through the beginning of September.

Keene native George Wheelock attended local schools and graduated from Harvard College in the 1830s. He chose the field of law as his career and entered the law office of his brother-in-law, John Henry Elliot, upon his return to Keene. He seemed destined for a successful career as a lawyer.

Young Wheelock soon realized that the work of an attorney did not fit his personal needs or desires. He longed to be in the great outdoors and soon became Keene's leading naturalist. He was a founding member of the Forest Tree Society in 1840, an organization formed to beautify and improve the town by planting trees along the streets. From that beginning he went on to enhance the muddy common by setting out trees and enclosing what became the park at Central Square. Wheelock was a founder of the Keene Natural History Society and a leader in the movement to develop the Woodland Cemetery, Keene's first "garden" cemetery.

It was in the 1880s and 1890s, however, that George Wheelock began a movement of land conservation in the city that continues to the present day. He purchased the old Agricultural Fair

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
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Rhiannon Hutchinson JD Ctr. Assistant Grounds in West Keene and donated the land to the city for use as a public park. He followed this donation with a gift of 95 acres on Beech Hill that became Robin Hood Forest.

Wheelock laid out trails, planted trees, and named natural features in the parks. He was chosen as Keene's first Park Commissioner in 1888 and held the post until his death. In that position, he developed a tradition of land conservation in the city and implemented procedures for the care of public parklands.

The parklands that resulted from George Wheelock's desire to use nature to improve the quality of life in the city are only one example of how people have interacted with nature in southwest New Hampshire. Humans have

impacted and interacted with nature throughout the history of the Monadnock region. In turn, nature has impacted, and continues to impact, the life of people in the area. The region's farms, industries, forest use, transportation infrastructure, land conservation, outdoor sports, and recreation offer a wide variety of artistic opportunities. Artists have been encouraged to create works that illustrate the interactions people have with nature and how this affects their own lives.

The "Nature and Humanity" exhibit will be in place at the Historical Society from June 3 through September 3, 2022. The exhibit will open with a reception on June 3rd from 4:00 to 6:00 pm. Artwork will be for sale. A variety of related programs will be scheduled through the summer, including plein air days, a nature hike, gallery tours led by artists, and more. 

Sixty years ago, in 1962, F. Nelson Blount's Monadnock, Steamtown & Northern Railroad thundered out of Keene on the Boston & Maine Railroad's Cheshire Branch, briefly returning the Elm City to the nostalgic era of steam railroading. Meanwhile, plans for the largest steam railroading museum in the United States, Steamtown U.S.A., bubbled to the brink of possibility for Keene only to be extinguished by red tape and political delays. In a dynamic presentation, Rick Kfoury, author of *Steam Trains of Yesteryear: The Monadnock, Steamtown & Northern Story*, will examine Keene's last chance for railroad prominence with never-beforeseen photographs, documents, 8mm film, and in-person accounts.

2021 Annual Report Director's Message

We have lived through a historic 24-month period since the Historical Society of Cheshire County first closed its doors due to the emerging coronavirus pandemic in March of 2020. We have experienced stay at home orders, variants, quarantines, masking, testing, vaccines, supply shortages, and much more. Today, in March of 2022, there is growing optimism in the country as we now understand COVID-19 more clearly and public health initiatives have had a positive impact.

The Historical Society has fully reopened to the public. Programming requests have increased dramatically, including in-person programming, and exhibits have been well attended. We are moving toward more "normal" operations and scheduling of events. Despite the challenges of the last two years, the Historical Society of Cheshire County has learned a great deal about sharing its programming with a wider and more distant audience during the past months.

With a stay-at-home order in place we were compelled to find ways to offer programs in new formats to stay in contact with our audience and to remain relevant in the community. Social media and online programming became essential to our ongoing success. We quickly discovered that online programs could attract 200 to 250 people whereas the same program presented in our facility might have drawn 100 attendees at most. Even more importantly, many of the online attendees would not have been able to attend in person for a variety of reasons. Furthermore, when these programs were recorded, they could be offered to the public long after the events took place; our reach had expanded by accident.

Testimonials began to arrive by mail and email. The following quote from a letter received in February of 2021 sums up the impact of virtual programming. "Without the pandemic I would not have found you, and would not have driven to Keene to join the CALL classes or your presentations at the Historical Society. Something very wonderful came from the pandemic! I would love it if post-pandemic you might still make your programs available online."

We have taken the lessons of pandemic programming to heart. The Society has undertaken a fundraising effort to support the acquisition and use of state-of the-art technology to enhance and extend both inhouse and hybrid programming. We hope that much of that technology will be in place by the end of 2022.

The Society reopened to the public in mid-2021 with the exhibit "The Ghost Army: Combat Con Artists of WWII." This proved to be one of the most popular exhibits we have ever mounted. The Society also hosted "NH Now," one of eight concurrent exhibits of recent professional photography from across the state. Other collaborations included the publication of archaeologist Robert Goodby's book *A Deep Presence*; 13,000 Years of Native American History and a continuation of the regional project "Recovering Black History in NH."
